#### **Rector's Reflection**

Dear Church Family,

The story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) is probably my second favorite post-Resurrection narrative. It's the story of two disciples walking along the road feeling dejected, depressed, full of grief at the crucifixion and death of Jesus. A stranger suddenly appears walking beside them, asking them what's wrong. At the words of this stranger their hearts are opened, and outpours a flood of painful emotions as they explain that Jesus, on whom they had placed all their hopes, was dead. Jesus, still appearing as a stranger to them, comforts them and explains, "Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?"

The three men continued together until they arrived at Emmaus, where they sat down for the evening meal. Jesus then took the bread that was on the table "and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight."

Notice that Jesus freely appears to his disciples in their grief. They weren't seeking him out or even asking for him to be present. They thought he was dead! Yet Jesus knew their hearts, and he came and walked alongside them, giving them comfort and reassurance even as a stranger.

The span of 2,000 years has not changed the nature of our savior. When we are in pain and grief he is nearer to us than we could ever imagine. He truly is walking beside us even though we don't recognize him. That is the nature of his love, the nature of his death and resurrection. They occurred so that Jesus could walk with us always, as he said in Matthew 28:20, "Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Know that Jesus walks beside you in this life in pain and in grief, as well as in joy and in celebration. You may not recognize him, but he's there.
